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## 1. UCLA National Champs Together Again As Pros

On one particularly sunny day last week in Syracuse, a glance down the practice range brought into view three players taking a quick time out from hitting balls. At closer look, two were performing cartwheels that lacked sadly in style points while one snapped photos with her cell-phone camera.

Yes, that was Charlotte Mayorkas, ranked second on the Duramed FUTURES Tour's current money list, twirling heels over hands alongside former UCLA teammate Mo Martin as another Bruin, Gina Umeck, played photographer. This was normal stuff for a trio of spirited players who helped UCLA win the 2004 NCAA Women's Golf Championship. Only a wedge shot away, just down the range, were two other members of that team, Bridget Dwyer and Saki Uechi.

But even though school is out for the five members of the Duramed FUTURES Tour who helped the UCLA program win its second NCAA team title, the squad is still intact, they say. Now all professionals and chasing the dream of moving on to the LPGA Tour, the five still lean on each other to meet their goals. And just as it was during their college days, Mayorkas is still setting the pace.

"When I got to UCLA my freshman year, there were 14 girls competing for five spots on the travel team," said Umeck, 24, of Redlands, Calif. "Charlotte was there, and then there were four more spots."

"Charlotte set the pace for the rest of us," added Uechi, 24, of Redondo Beach, Calif. "After practice, she was still hitting balls. She stepped it up and was a great role model. Because of her, everyone worked hard."

Mayorkas did, in fact, win her No. 1 spot on the Bruins' squad by the middle of her sophomore year. But the competition for the remaining four positions was intense. That intensity drove the team's fire and took a team that had won its only NCAA championship in 1991, back to the big dance.

"When I was a freshman, UCLA was ranked somewhere close to 30<sup>th</sup>," said Dwyer, 25, of Kailua, Hawaii.

"It had been five years since our school's women's team had even *qualified* for nationals," added Martin, 23, of Altadena, Calif.

But with fresh talent and a willingness by the newcomers to spend the extra hours in the gym and in the practice areas, coach Carrie Leary Forsyth soon discovered that her "developing players" were just what she needed.

"These five players were the foundation that raised us to the level we're at now and I'm eternally grateful to all of them," she said. "They all had good junior records, but they weren't winning big national championships. They were the kind of players who bought into the idea of going to a great school and playing in a program where they could get better."

And it had a domino effect, keying largely off the work ethic of Mayorkas who sometimes had to be reminded to go home or to leave the gym.

"Charlotte made a decision about the kind of player she wanted to be and she would work hard in the gym and be out there just grinding on the golf course," said Forsyth. "And then she started to win. It was a great lesson for all the others."

That fire fed her teammates. Dwyer recalls watching a Golf Channel college golf show with her UCLA teammates and hearing the announcer say it was "Duke all the way" at that year's NCAA Championship.

"I think a few bottles of water and maybe a pillow were thrown at that TV," said Martin.

More importantly, a few birdies were thrown at the Blue Devils, as well as at Oklahoma State at the 2004 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship at Auburn's Grand National Golf Course in Auburn, Ala. By the second round, the Bruins led Duke by one shot. By the third round, UCLA led by five shots. After several rain delays, UCLA finally closed out the NCAA title, finishing the 72-hole team total (counting the four lowest of five scores) at 1,148 strokes (-4). As a team, they played the final nine holes at five under. Mayorkas was the team leader, finishing fourth individually, followed by Umeck at 16<sup>th</sup> overall.

"All of us won a national championship together," said Mayorkas, 22, of San Diego and now, Las Vegas. "We'll always be blue and gold."

But while the five players and the others on the team vying for spots in tournaments through the team's weekly qualifying rounds were focused on what they had to do to win, they also were, well, college kids having some fun along the way.

Umeck and Martin, notorious for their pranks, were sitting in the business center at a Doubletree Hotel during a team trip to Tucson, Arizona when they noticed a typewriter and the hotel's stationery letterhead in the workspace. So Umeck sat down at the typewriter and pecked out a letter to her coach: *Dear Resident Leary, We have received numerous complaints at the Doubletree of excessive noise in Room 312. There are even sounds of broken glass. Therefore, we are imposing a \$350 reckless behavior fee to uphold the Doubletree's standards in an effort to protect the rights of our other guests.*"

Umeck and Martin folded the letter, stuffed it into an envelope and when they went to Coach Leary's room for a team breakfast (she is now married and goes by Carrie

Forsyth), shoved it into her folded newspaper. Only Umeck and Martin knew about the letter.

After a while, they hear their coach say, "Oh!" And then they hear her ask, "Who is in Room 312?" Dwyer, the quiet and always-cheerful player who shared a room with Mayorkas, raised her hand and said, "Me!" Then the coach started reading the letter and demanded to know what was going on in her room.

"Coach looked like she was going to strangle me and she was like, 'DO NOT LIE TO ME!'" said Dwyer.

When the coach reached for the telephone to call the front desk, Martin intercepted the phone and instructed the coach to look at the word "excessive" in the typed letter, which they had accidentally misspelled with one S. Only then did the coach know she had been the victim of another prank.

"I should have been suspicious," admitted the coach last week by telephone. "It was an excellent stunt."

But while the group kept their coach on their toes for four years -- all graduating -- they also were busy improving their skills and moving toward their next goal of playing excellent professional golf. Mayorkas won her first professional tournament this spring in Tucson and has maintained top-10 finishes regularly to hold on to her No. 2 spot on the Tour's money list. Martin fired a final-round 68 last week in Syracuse, N.Y., to finish tied for 14<sup>th</sup> and stay at 49<sup>th</sup> on the money list. Dwyer currently is ranked 64<sup>th</sup>, while Umeck is No. 72. Uechi is working her way up the list at No. 166 after eight events.

They also draw on each other's wisdom.

"Melissa [Mo] always used to say, 'You can never make a straight hitter into a scrambler, but you can make a scrambler into a straight hitter,'" said Uechi. "She's both."

"I like the one where she [Martin] always says, 'It only takes one good shot to make a par,'" added Mayorkas.

The five players can no longer lean on each other to win tournaments, but they often practice together or hook up for dinners at the end of the day. Each is on her own journey as a professional and they still compare notes and look to each other for comfort and advice. That, they say, is the residual effect of playing college golf together.

Mayorkas and Martin still see each other across nearby fairways and dance an awkward jig they call "the birdie dance" to encourage birdies. Dwyer still makes killer low-fat brownies. Umeck still carries two 7-woods in her bag, which she calls the "Big 7-wood" and the "Little 7-wood," which Mayorkas claims her former teammate can hit "anywhere from 120 to 180 yards." And Uechi, which her teammates call the "genuinely sweet one" of the team, can still be counted on for an honest opinion on just about anything.

The "team" is pulling for Mayorkas to get one of the five LPGA Tour cards awarded at the end of the year to the top five money winners. And they are rooting for Dwyer to win The Golf Channel's Big Break VI show, which airs in September, of which she is a member of the cast. But most of all, they are always there for each other along the highways of the Tour's 19 tournaments in 14 states.

"When you're not in the team environment anymore, you can value the relationships and the people," said coach Forsyth. "They can still have a sense of camaraderie even

though they're worrying about their own ball. That's the greatest gift of college golf for these players."

And by the look of the impromptu gymnastics last week on the range in Syracuse, the sense of camaraderie certainly is still there with the five former Bruin teammates.

"We had a big variety of personalities on our team," said Dwyer.

"Kind of like a big stew," said Martin.

"And coach was stirring the caldron," added Umeck.

## **2. Howland Is "One-Grand" Champ**

Janell Howland won last week's fourth installment of the YES! Golf One Grand Challenge. The putting contest started with 26 members of the Duramed FUTURES Tour who have used a YES! Golf C-Groove putter in at least 10 rounds this season. The field was then narrowed down to the top three finishers and ties after two rounds on a nine-hole "course" set up on the practice green at The Links at Erie Village last week in Syracuse, N.Y. Those four players -- Howland of Boise, Idaho, Julie Tvede of Copenhagen, Denmark, Lisa Fernandes of Jacksonville, Fla., and Julie Turner-Peluso of Skaneateles, N.Y., then went into a sudden-death playoff. Turner and Fernandes were eliminated, leaving Howland and Tvede to play until there was a winner.

Howland rolled in a 27-foot birdie putt to win on the fifth hole of sudden-death, picking up the \$1,000 cash prize using the C-Groove "Tiffany" model. She becomes the fourth player to win a "One-Grand" contest this year, joining Kristin Samp of Mobley, Mo., who won in McAllen, Texas; Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., who won in Lake Geneva, Wis.; and Lisa Fernandes who won in Decatur, Ill. The final "One-Grand Challenge" will be held in September at the Tour's final tournament in Albany, N.Y.

## **3. Mussani Strikes Again**

Salimah Mussani already has had the best season of her professional golf career, winning the Tour's only major championship, the Michelob ULTRA Duramed FUTURES Players Championship, in mid-June. Mussani also won a CN Canadian Women's Tour event earlier this summer, then capped off her season with another win north of the border last Tuesday at the Ottawa Hunt and Golf Club. The native of Burlington, Ontario fired rounds of 66-66 to post a 36-hole score of 132 to win by eight shots over fellow Duramed FUTURES Tour member Lisa Meldrum of Kirkland, Quebec.

"I had three bogeys in two rounds and they were all three-putt greens," said Mussani, 26, a former collegian at Stanford University who carded 15 birdies in two days. "I'm finally healthy and every week, I feel like I can contend."

With her first win on the Canadian Women's Tour, Mussani qualified for the LPGA's CN Canadian Women's Open in London, Ontario, set for Aug. 3-6. And with her win at the Michelob ULTRA Duramed FUTURES Players Championship, she qualified to compete in the LPGA's State Farm Classic in Springfield, Ill., set for Aug. 31 through Sept. 3. Playing a full schedule on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, as well as the two LPGA Tour events, requires some attentive pacing by Mussani, who constantly fights the symptoms of Lupus disease.

"With my position on the Tour's money list, it's hard to sit out those two weeks," said Mussani, who is currently ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in earnings for the 2006 season. "But a win is a win and hopefully, I can keep the momentum going."

Other Duramed FUTURES Tour members who have earned an exemption into the LPGA's CN Canadian Women's Open next month are: Lisa Meldrum of Kirkland, Quebec; Jessica Shepley of Oakville, Ontario; Cheryl Mitchell of Walpole Island, Ontario; and Michelle Simpson of New Smyrna Beach, Fla.

In addition to Mussani and Meldrum, Duramed FUTURES Tour members finishing in the top 10 of last week's CN Canadian Women's Tour were: 4<sup>th</sup> - Jessica Shepley 71-71-142; T-6<sup>th</sup> - Cheryl Mitchell 70-75-145; and Michelle Simpson 78-69-147.

#### 4. Tour Chat

**HA-NA CHAE** of Seoul, Korea, became the 10<sup>th</sup> recipient of the MIO Golf XE player program "First-Time Winner" Award. She received a MIO Golf XE watch. Each Duramed FUTURES Tour player who wins their first Tour event also wins a MIO Golf XE watch. MIO Golf XE is the "Official Golf Watch" of the Duramed FUTURES Tour... **IN-BEE PARK** of Las Vegas is the Duramed FUTURES Tour Series 4 winner. Park earned the most prize money in the Tour's fourth series of three events with \$13,101. Park edged out **ASHLEY PRANGE** of Noblesville, Ind., by \$80. Prange earned \$13,021 in the three events...

**ASHLEY PRANGE** won the YES! Golf C-Groove Challenge: "Lip Out" Series last week. Participants in this event must have used a YES! Golf C-Groove putter for a minimum of nine rounds. Prange earned points based on tournament finishes using the putter. She was trailed by second-place finisher **JI MIN JEONG** of Kyungki, Korea; third-place finisher **ANGELA PARK** of Torrance, Calif., and tied for fourth-place was **LORI ATSEDES** of Ithaca, N.Y., and **MOLLIE FANKHAUSER** of Columbus, Ohio. Prange collected \$2,000 for winning the "Lip Out" Series. Jeong earned \$1,250, Park collected \$1,000, while Atsedes and Fankhauser pocketed \$375. The final series called the "Gimme" series, begins in Concord, N.H., and finishes in Albany, N.Y...

Battling jetlag last week was **LEE-ANNE PACE** of Mosselbay, South Africa and **SAMANTHA HEAD** of Bedford, England. Both competed in the Ladies European Tour event the week before in Hungary... After a mix-up with tournament entry deadlines for both the LPGA Tour's event in Toledo, Ohio and the Duramed FUTURES Tour's tournament in Connecticut, LPGA non-exempt member **HYE JUNG CHOI** of Seoul, Korea was forced to sit out of both events two weeks ago. Choi rebounded with a first-round score of 68 last week in Syracuse and credited having to sit on the sidelines with helping her get off to a fast start. "I was just outside watching, which was good for me," she said. "I just rested, relaxed, thought and practiced a lot and I was ready to play when I got here..."

Tour member **ASHLEY PRANGE** of Noblesville, Ind., will launch her four-episode show on The Golf Channel this week. The first show of "Game On: Ashley's Big Break" will air at 9:30 p.m. (Eastern) Tuesday on The Golf Channel. Shows will continue for the next three Tuesday nights leading up to Prange's LPGA Tour exemption at the Safeway Classic from Aug. 18-20, in Portland, Ore. Prange won the spot in the tournament field by winning The Golf Channel's "Big Break V: Hawaii" show earlier this year...

Former Duke University teammates **LEIGH ANNE HARDIN** of Martinsville, Ind., and **KRISTINA (ENGSTROM) TUCKER** of Stockholm, Sweden both fired scores of five-under-par 66 last week to share the first-round lead with two others. The week before, Hardin missed the cut in Connecticut and caddied for her old teammate in the final round. Last week was a different story for the former U.S. Girls' Junior champion and NCAA All-American. "It will be a lot more fun to play with Kristina than to caddie for her," said Hardin, heading into the second round of the Alliance Bank FUTURES Golf Classic...

It always helps to have someone in your corner when you are competing. **DANIELLE DOWNEY** of Spencerport, N.Y., asked her sister Erica Downey to caddie for her last week during the tournament in Syracuse, N.Y. The older sister was a former

cheerleader at Syracuse University... How do players relax prior to the start of a tournament? **MARIANNE MORRIS** of Middletown, Ohio and **MICHELLE SIMPSON** of New Smyrna Beach, Fla., were spotted fishing in a pond at The Links at Erie Village early in the week... A couple of Duramed FUTURES Tour alums and current LPGA Tour members showed up last week to help out old friends with caddie duties and offer support. **MEREDITH DUNCAN** of Shreveport, La., caddied for **MEAGHAN FRANCELLA** of Port Chester, N.Y., while **KYLIE PRATT** of Mackay, Australia (who now caddies on the LPGA Tour for former Duramed FUTURES Tour member **LINDSEY WRIGHT** of Albury, Australia) caddied for Tour member **DANA LACEY** of North Beach, Western Australia. #### 6. The Road To The LPGA

Remarkably, there was no movement within the top nine spots on the Duramed FUTURES Tour's Money List last week. Song-Hee Kim of Seoul, Korea maintained her top spot with earnings of \$59,429 in 13 events, followed by No. 2 Charlotte Mayorkas of Las Vegas at \$37,974, No. 3 In-Bee Park of Las Vegas at \$35,200; No. 4 Ashley Prange of Noblesville, Ind., at \$32,872; and No. 5 Allison Fouch of Grand Rapids, Mich., at \$29,060.

Unchanged in the top nine is No. 6 Mollie Fankhauser of Columbus, Ohio; No. 7 Angela Park of Torrance, Calif.; No. 8 Meaghan Francella of Port Chester, N.Y.; and No. 9 Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C.

Salimah Mussani of Burlington, Ontario switched spots on the money list with Sarah Huarte of Shingle Springs, Calif. Mussani moved from 11<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup>, while Huarte dipped to 11<sup>th</sup>.

Last week's winner Ha-Na Chae of Seoul, Korea made a sizeable jump up the money list from No. 35 to No. 14, while Smriti Mehra of Calcutta, India improved from 21<sup>st</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup>. Last week's tournament runner-up Katie Allison of Mahwah, N.J. charged from 39<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup>.

Big moves in the top 50 also include: Kristina Tucker of Stockholm, Sweden, who improved from 50<sup>th</sup> to 37<sup>th</sup>; Julie Turner-Peluso of Skaneateles, N.Y., moving from 65<sup>th</sup> to No. 43; and Liz Janangelo of West Hartford, Conn., who jumped from 89<sup>th</sup> to 50<sup>th</sup> in season earnings after four tournaments.

#### 7. Rookie Ha-Na Chae Earns First Professional Win In Syracuse

On paper, she's a 20-year-old rookie. On the golf course, Ha-Na Chae proved she has the tools to beat 143 other professionals.

Not only did Chae win the \$70,000 Alliance Bank FUTURES Golf Classic by two shots, but she also battled back from a double-bogey on the seventh hole to roll in five

more birdies on the back nine to grab the lead for good. Chae carded a three-under-par final-round score of 68 today and finished with a three-day total of 204 (-9).

The rookie edged Katie Allison (69) of Mahwah, N.J., who carded a seven-under-par total of 206 for second place at The Links at Erie Village.

"I can't believe what happened today," said Chae, a native of Seoul, Korea. "I was just waiting for the chances to come. I didn't give up for three days."

The rookie showed her patience early. Co-leaders from the second round, Kristina Tucker of Stockholm, Sweden and Smriti Mehra of Calcutta, India, both birdied the second hole to take a one-shot lead over Chae. But Chae tied Mehra when she birdied and Tucker bogeyed the fifth hole. More often than not, when a rookie is in contention for the first time and suffers a double-bogey early in the round -- as Chae did on the seventh hole -- they struggle to climb back into the game. But Chae thought back to something her dad had told her months ago.

"After the double on No. 7, I was shaking a little bit and just trying to find a rhythm and find my tempo," said Chae, with the interpreting help of fellow pro Sunny Oh of Las Vegas. "My father is in Seoul, but he told me to always be patient and to wait, and that things will come. After that double-bogey happened, I thought about what my dad said. And I was waiting."

"I thought she was out of it after she hit her ball into the water on No. 7, but she really came back on the second nine holes with a lot of birdies," added Tucker, 26, a third-year pro. "She hit it to eight feet on the 10<sup>th</sup>, and hit it really close on the 11<sup>th</sup>. From there, she just got momentum. Sometimes you have to work to make birdies, but they seemed to drop for her."

And they dropped often. Chae drained birdies on holes 10, 11 and 12. She lost a shot with a bogey on the 14<sup>th</sup> when she landed in a fairway bunker and didn't get up and down for par, but then she drained a 40-footer for birdie on the 15<sup>th</sup> and hit her shot on the 16<sup>th</sup> to within three feet.

"The 15<sup>th</sup> was the deciding hole," said Tucker. "If she would have three-putted there, it would have been a whole different story, but she pulled off the shots whenever she needed them. That's what good golf is about."

Playing a group ahead of Chae was Allison, who tied Chae for the lead with her 12-foot birdie on the 15<sup>th</sup>. The former LPGA Tour member moved within two shots of Chae with two to play. With a good read on the 18<sup>th</sup> green, Allison made a run at a birdie chance from 22 feet, hoping for a birdie and maybe a bogey by Chae for a playoff opportunity. But the birdie putt didn't fall and Chae's hands didn't shake when she calmly two-putted a 25-footer downhill for par on the 18<sup>th</sup> for the win.

"I played with Ha-Na last week and she struggled a bit, but she figured out what she was supposed to do and really capitalized on her birdie chances today," said Allison, 26, a third-year pro who finished the day with two birdies and no bogeys. "She might be a rookie, but she has some shots in her bag. She knows how to work the ball and she stays composed."

Plenty of players were chasing Chae, but none were able to catch her on the back nine, which she played at four-under par. Tying for third at 207 (-6) was the quartet of Tucker (71), Mehra (71), Julie Turner-Peluso (67) of Skaneateles, N.Y., and Liz Janangelo (68) of West Hartford, Conn.

Making valiant final-round charges were Salimah Mussani (65) of Burlington, Ontario, who tied for seventh at 208 (-5); Allison Fouch (66) of Grand Rapids, Mich., and Ashley Hoagland (67) of Palmetto, Fla., who tied for 11<sup>th</sup> at 209; and Kristy

McPherson (65) of Conway, S.C., and Mollie Fankhauser (67) of Columbus, Ohio, who tied for 14<sup>th</sup> at 210.

Prior to today's win, Chae had posted a career-best tie for eighth at the Tour's event in Decatur, Ill., and she had finished in the top 10 in 13 tournaments. Her \$9,800 winner's check today moved her from 35<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> on the Tour's season money list.

"She has made every cut," said Sunny Oh. "Ha-Na played on the Korean National Team, which is pretty strong. I think she was ready to win."

"She won so many times in Korean junior tournaments, so it's not that much of a surprise," added fellow Tour member Su A Kim of Seoul, who tied for 14<sup>th</sup> at 210. "Song-Hee [Kim] is a four-time winner this year and she's a rookie too, so when other Korean girls saw that, they say it is possible to win. Ha-Na is a winner now."

That, she is. Her peers shook cans of beer and sprayed the quiet player on the 18<sup>th</sup> green until her shirt was soaked. During the awards ceremony, her mother, Hyoung Lim Lee, stepped into some tall pampas grass beside the clubhouse with her cell phone and called home to Korea to tell her husband the good news.

And Chae, delivering her winner's speech in careful English, finally made that huge leap from amateur to professional golf with a bouquet of flowers in her arms and TV cameras in her face. She admitted to taking "lots of deep breaths."

"A lot of people cheered for me and now as a pro, I am thinking about more stuff," she said. "I knew that I couldn't give up because of all the attention. You can do that in junior golf, but you can't do that as a pro."
