## California Cool: Sarah Huarte Off To Solid Rookie Season July 25, 2005 By: Lisa D. Mickey

Talk about a cool Californian. It was in the middle of the fourth round during the 2004 NCAA Women's Golf Championship and Sarah Huarte was five holes away from winning the national individual title. A storm blew in and play was suspended. Huarte disappeared.

"We were all worried about her and we were thinking she must be pretty nervous because she was about to win the national championship," said Anne Walker, assistant coach at the University of California at Berkeley. "But when we found her, she was in the training room taking a nap. I don't know many players who can take a nap when they're getting ready to win the NCAA title."

Huarte grabbed that power nap, then powered her way to the NCAA individual crown, leading her Cal team to its best-ever fourth-place finish in the national championship. In its 10-year history, the Cal women's team never even qualified for the NCAA Championship until Huarte arrived as a freshman in 2000-2001, and with Huarte in the lineup, the Bears advanced to nationals all four years.

"Sometimes, I wanted to see her get fired up and show some emotion, but then I realized that was just Sarah -- a fierce competitor who is really laid back," added Cal head coach Nancy McDaniel. "Her great strength is she's a very focused young woman who is intellectually on top of it all, but she keeps things very simple."

And as everyone knows, simple is good in golf.

Huarte (rhymes with Stewart) has maintained her simple approach to the game even as she has made the transition as the 2004 champion of collegiate golf to a rookie touring professional on the 2005 FUTURES Golf

Tour. In eight events, she has posted three top-10 finishes, including a season-best tie for fourth, has made all eight cuts and has carded a season-low round of 67. But one of the biggest factors, not traced on a stat sheet, has been the variable of homesickness for the rookie.

"For me, it's been hard because we play so far from home," said Huarte, 23, of Shingle Springs, Calif. "When I was at Cal, I was only two hours away and it was nice to be able to go home. It's been a reality check because sometimes I think I'd rather be at home working. But a lot of people would trade places with me to be doing what I'm doing and I know I have to just keep plugging away. Obviously, my goal is to be on the LPGA Tour and I know this is part of the process." **(SEE Huarte, PAGE 3)**

## CHAMP Northeast Challenge Concludes This Week

This week's tournament in Syracuse, N.Y., will culminate the CHAMP Spikes Northeast Challenge -- a four-tournament bonus-pool competition held in the Northeast states. After three of the four weeks, Seon-Hwa Lee of Chonan, Korea leads the race for bonus bucks with 110 points, and is trailed by the three-way tie of Natalie Wong of Montebello, Calif., Jamie Stevenson of Mayfield, Utah and Sun Young Yoo of Seoul, all with 45.0 points. Rounding out the top five are Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., and Bo Mi Suh of Seoul, tied with 40.0 points.

CHAMP Spikes launched the promotion during the tournament in Connecticut three weeks ago to reward players who use their product during the Tour's four tournaments in the Northeast. A tiered points system awards cash prizes to the top five players, including a first-place check worth \$1,000. Cash prizes will be awarded this week in Syracuse during Sunday's awards ceremony.

## Monacelli Scores Ace

Christina Monacelli of Ocean Ridge, Fla., scored a hole-in-one on the 171-yard par-three 17th hole during the first round of last week's Laconia Savings Bank FUTURES Golf Classic. The rookie used a TaylorMade 22-degree Rescue Club to score the ace -- her second in competition. She was awarded \$500 for the shot in the Donald T. Ostop Hole-in-One Challenge.



"I saw it land just below the hole to the right and I knew that area funnels down to the left," said Monacelli. "I bent down to pick up my tee and missed it as it dropped into the hole."

As an aside, Janell Howland of Boise, Idaho said she feels like a lucky charm because

she was playing in Monacelli's group during last Friday's hole-in-one and also had her own ace earlier this year during the FUTURES Tour tournament in El Paso, Texas.

## Road to the LPGA Tour

Only two players among the top five money winners on the FUTURES Golf Tour changed positions, but all five remained intact following last week's 13th tournament. Seon-Hwa Lee of Chonan, Korea remained in the No. 1 spot with earnings of \$45,506, while Kyeong Bae of Seoul, Korea moved to No. 2 and swapped positions with Virada Nirapathpongporn of Bangkok, Thailand, who dropped to No. 3. Even after three weeks away from the Tour, Nicole Castrale of Palm Desert, Calif., remained at No. 4, while Jenny Gleason of Clearwater, Fla., stayed in the fifth position.

Making key moves into the top 30 were Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., who moved up from 19th to 12th, while Sarah Huarte of Shingle Springs, Calif., improved from 31st to 26th. Meredith Duncan of Shreveport, La., jumped from 36th to 29th.

Several other players made the biggest leaps up the money list with top-10 finishes in last week's event. Libby Smith of Essex Junction, Vt., moved from 47th to 39th, while tournament runner-up Bo Mi Suh of Seoul, Korea improved from 79th to 43rd after only seven events. Canadian Kareen Qually of Olds, Alberta also made a giant leap from 107th to 59th on the money list, while Michelle Murphy of Portland, Ore., improved from 121st to 72nd after three tournaments.

With five events remaining in the 18-tournament schedule, count on the jockeying to continue for the top five spots with the grand prize 2006 LPGA Tour cards up for grabs.

Huarte's development as a young pro actually began years ago when her active and highly competitive family skied and snowboarded in Idaho during the winter months. Huarte began playing golf at age 13, but regarded it as a summer activity. By age 16, golf had become a year-round sport and had begun to take a higher place on her activities calendar than the travel soccer team she played on, or the high school basketball team that she led as the point guard. Huarte also had played junior tennis, softball, ran track and swam. But when a knee injury and the resulting surgery knocked her out of basketball for a year, Huarte turned her focus entirely to golf.

And when it came time to play college golf, the Californian looked at three schools -- Ohio State, Oregon State and Cal. It was snowing when she made her official visit to Ohio State and she really wanted to go to Oregon State until she visited Cal. Cal made sense to the self-described homebody. She could go home on some weekends and her family could come to see her play.

"She was California talent and that gave us a real boost locally," said McDaniel. "Sarah sort of came in under the radar, but she was an incredible athlete. She came in hitting it only 225 to 230 yards off the tee and that really bugged the crap out of her. So Sarah went to the weight room, filled out her shoulders and improved her distance."

Huarte also arrived with a good athletic pedigree. Her uncle John Huarte won the 1964 Heisman Trophy as a quarterback at Notre Dame University. Her mom, Judy, was an ultra-marathon runner (running races of 30+ miles), her dad, Jim, played college football at St. Mary's College (Calif.), her sister, Laura, became a top pole vaulter at Notre Dame and her two brothers excelled in golf, tennis and snowboarding.

"She's just very motivated, very driven and very competitive," said Anna Temple, 23, a FUTURES Tour rookie of Berkeley, Calif., who played on the Cal team with Huarte and roomed with the Northern Californian for two years. "I met her in junior golf when we were both 14 and she was better than me even then."

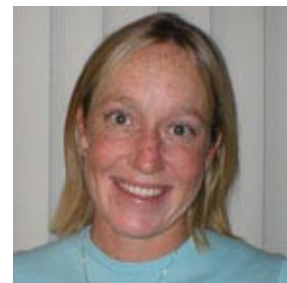
Temple and Huarte had many lights-out conversations from their bunk beds -- Huarte on the top bunk and Temple on a precarious and slightly tilted bottom bunk. The two shared house rules that they couldn't discuss religion or politics -- two areas where they sharply contrast. They also shared "dumb stuff" moments, like

locking themselves out of their apartment and having to break in, book discussions and in general, a solid friendship based on mutual respect.

"Her competitive drive is driven by her confidence in herself," said Temple, who watched her friend win the 2004 South Atlantic Women's Amateur Championship, the 2004 NCAA Championship and was with her when Huarte was

named to the 2004 U.S. Curtis Cup team alongside such teammates as Paula Creamer and Michelle Wie. "I know how hard she has been working and to see it all click for her has been great. Sarah can go as far as she wants to go."

That was evident earlier this summer when Huarte qualified for the U.S. Women's Open Championship. On the car ride home from the qualifier, she and Coach Walker, who served as her caddie, talked about Huarte's goals at the Open. Huarte told her coach that she hoped for a top-40 finish. Walker suggested that she should shoot for a top-20 performance. Huarte agreed and finished tied for 23rd in her first U.S. Women's Open appearance.



That performance tied her with Annika Sorenstam, Wie, Nicole Perrot, Helen Alfredsson, Laura Diaz, Jennifer Rosales and Gloria Park. Huarte also was fourth in driving accuracy for the week at the Open. Her only regret was that she was so eager to deposit her \$34,000 paycheck into her bank account that she forgot to photocopy it as a souvenir.

"Sarah was successful at the Open because she doesn't over-analyze anything and she was able to set clear, smaller goals and approach it like just another tournament," said Walker. "She wasn't overwhelmed by it all."

When asked if it was hard to return to the FUTURES Tour, Huarte's response was quick.

"The Women's Open was a confidence booster, but I'm coming back out here to do what I have to do so that the Open can become a frequent tournament that I play," she said. "I mostly left from the Open with affirmations. I hit a lot of fairways and greens. I don't make a lot of big mistakes. I play well on tough courses. And I'm going to fix my putting."

Huarte didn't have the greatest senior season at Cal before she won the NCAA Championship and she wasn't expected to win the individual crown. But as her coaches point out, she knew she could win. And when she set an NCAA women's record at 10-under-par 278, nobody was surprised.

Especially when she emerged sleepy-eyed from the training room, ready to close the deal on the national title.

"That's just Sarah," said Walker. "No frills and no drama." And always cool enough to contend.

# Tournament Summary

## Kyeong Bae Wins Nailbiter In New Hampshire

For those who have watched second-year player Kyeong Bae compete, there is no mistaking whose voice she hears most often. Bae's father, Chan Soo Bae -- a former professional soccer player for Spain's Real Madrid -- doubles as the player's caddie and van driver, as well as her biggest cheerleader and most outspoken critic.

Remarkably, young Bae has the calm ability to hear it all and remain largely unaffected by her demonstrative dad. But on Sunday morning, it was the quiet voice of her mother that pulled her daughter aside before the final round and delivered three words: *Just trust yourself.*

When the \$65,000 Laconia Savings Bank FUTURES Golf Classic ended with a nail-biting finish, Kyeong Bae, 20, waved for her mother to join her in the trophy photo. Mi Ja Kim, a former world-class table tennis player, politely bowed, waved off her daughter, then finally dashed to the green for the photo. The family portrait was snapped and Kyeong Bae's second season win was complete.

"It was fantastic," said Bae of Seoul, Korea, who fired a three-under-par final round of 69 to win by one shot at 209 (-7). "My mom arrived [in the United States] four days ago and she gave me really great important thoughts for today."

For most of the round, however, it was not Bae who led the charge at the 6,283-yard Beaver Meadow Golf Course. Compatriot Bo Mi Suh, also of Seoul, entered today's final round with a two-shot lead, which she maintained for most of her front nine. But Suh spent the day wrestling with her approach shots, carding a final-round 74 (+2) with only one birdie and three bogeys -- the last an untimely blunder that cost Suh the tournament.

Throughout the afternoon, players had moved in and out of the shared lead alongside Suh, who scrambled for pars and gambled for birdies on her back nine. By the time Suh reached her 14th hole, Bae, Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., and top-ranked Seon-Hwa Lee of Chonan, Korea all were deadlocked with Suh at seven under par. Lee bogeyed the 15th hole to fall out of the lead, then Bae later bogeyed the same hole to leave only Suh and McPherson tied at the top.

But bogeys on 16 and 17 knocked McPherson out of the lead, handing Suh the lead alone once again. McPherson drained a 12-foot birdie on the 18th, but it was little consolation for missed par putts from two feet and eight feet on two of her last three holes.

"Those three holes -- 16, 17 and 18 -- are good holes, but of course I'm disappointed to take two bogeys in that stretch," said McPherson, who shot a final-round 69 to tie for second at 210 (-6). "I guess if you miss a two-footer, you can bogey any of them."

After Lee's birdie attempt on the 18th hole spun out of the cup, ending her last chance to join the leaders, the only player standing between Suh and her first FUTURES Tour win was Bae. And as expected, the quietly tenacious Bae birdied the 16th hole from 27 feet to once again draw even with Suh for the lead at seven under.

"My direction on my iron shots was not good all day today, but I still thought I could win," said Suh, 24, now in her fourth FUTURES Tour season.

Suh patiently plodded along, then watched as Bae gave back a shot with a bogey on the 17th hole when she misread her three-foot par putt and dropped to six-under par for the tournament.

"That made me mad," said Bae. "I had no choice but to

be aggressive on the last hole."

Suh held a one-stroke lead when their final group arrived at the par-four 18th tee. But when Suh's drive sailed into the right trees, Bae saw her opening. She knew if she made birdie on the final hole, she could force a playoff. What she didn't anticipate was that Suh might not be able to scramble, as she had all day, on this last hole.

Suh had played a similar punch shot out of the woods earlier in the round on the 10th hole to save par, so she felt confident standing over her second shot. But when her punched 7-iron landed 85 yards short of the hole, Suh knew she had to hit her sand wedge close. She knocked her shot to three feet and marked her ball to wait for Bae's putt.

Seeing Suh's trouble in the right trees, Bae steered her drive down the left side of the fairway on 18 and hit her approach shot to within 27 feet of the hole -- the same distance she'd had two holes earlier with her birdie putt on No. 16.

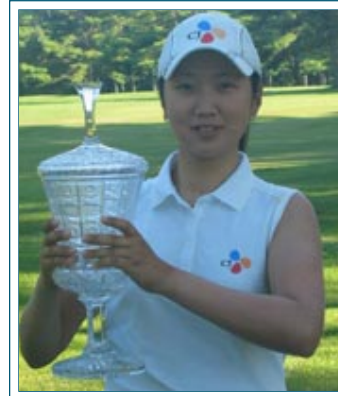
"I told myself to just try to make a good stroke on 18 like I had done on 16 -- to not be greedy, but to just make a good stroke," said Bae.

And good stroke it was, rolling uphill on a double-breaking line and falling into the hole for birdie. Now, Suh had to make her three-footer for par to join Bae in a sudden-death playoff. But Suh's par putt stayed left of the hole, giving Bae the win with the two-shot swing.

"She's a good player, but I was surprised that she made that putt [on the 18th hole]," said Suh, who settled into a tie for second with McPherson and Lee at 210 (-6). "I felt more pressure to make mine."

And with her winner's check for \$9,100, the Lakeland, Florida-based Bae moved into the No. 2 position on the season money list behind Lee.

All it took were a few quiet words of encouragement from her mom earlier in the day. That, and a little trust in herself when she needed it most.
