## Jamie Stevenson: New Personal Peace Finally Brings Success August 15, 2005

Sometimes when Jamie Stevenson stands on the tee with a driver in her hands at FUTURES Tour tournaments, her mind wanders back to her teenage years. She remembers how she would take her driver, a shag bag of golf balls and climb up into the White Mountains behind her home in Mayfield, Utah. It was at those higher elevations where she would tee it up and let her drives sail into the wind.

Those shots would hang over canyons, suspended in the sky for a few seconds, before disappearing somewhere deep below, never again to be found. It was empowering to this teenager to engage in such a solitary act, far from the structured golf course setting. And it was that moment of truth -- that collision of desire and technique -- that drove her to climb, to execute and to revel in the sheer joy of the act.

"You can hit them 400 yards that way," said Stevenson, now 28, and in her fifth season on the FUTURES Golf Tour. "It was such a great confidence booster."

Averaging nearly 280 yards off the tee, Stevenson still is one of the longest hitters on the FUTURES Golf Tour. This year, however, she has become more than just a woman with a big drive. She has become a player with a bigger goal and a better idea of where she is going and where she hopes to be.

After 12 tournaments this season, she already has earned more than her first four years combined on the

FUTURES Golf Tour. And when she tied for third at this year's Michelob ULTRA FUTURE S Charity Golf Classic, and then tied for second two tournaments later at the CIGNA Chip In For A Cure FUTURES Golf Classic -- on arguably, the most difficult course of

the 2005 season -- it begged the question: What is going on with Jamie Stevenson?

"My desire has always been strong and in the past, I've been very impatient with myself, pressing myself to meet my expectations," said Stevenson, now ranked No. 15 on the 2005 season money list.

"But what I've finally learned is that this is a process," added Stevenson. "The timing is not questioned anymore. I finally feel peaceful because it should be life that fills me up, not golf. The funny thing is that once I realized that making or missing putts is no longer critical, they go in."

## LPGA Veteran Caddies For Spanish Am

A 17-year LPGA Tour veteran showed up last week in Morgantown to caddie for a member of the Spanish National Women's Golf Team. Marta Figueras-Dotti, who won two LPGA tournaments in 1994, and who won the 1982 Women's British Open as an amateur, now serves as the coach of the Spanish National Team. Last week, she served as player/caddie for amateur special invitee Tania Elosegui of San Sebastian, Spain.

"It's been a big change from playing on the LPGA Tour (from 1983-2000) to coaching, but after I had my son, my priorities changed," said Figueras-Dotti, 47, who now lives in Madrid. "I see great potential. I always expected a lot of myself and now I expect a lot of them, but I have to temper it. I can relate to them and I hope they can learn a lot from my experience."

Her young charge, Elosegui, carded rounds of 72-74-76 to tie for 65th at 222 (+6) in her first professional event. After playing in the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship the week before, she wanted to test her amateur skills against the pros in last week's FUTURES Tour event in West Virginia as she decides whether or not to turn professional. With her LPGA veteran coach on the bag, the Spaniard walked away with a little more knowledge to help make her choice. **(SEE Caddie, PAGE 3)**

## Simpson Scores Ace

Michelle Simpson of New Smyrna Beach, Fla., scored a hole-in-one on the 203-yard, par-three 17th hole during the second round of last week's Betty Puskar FUTURES Golf Classic. Simpson used a TaylorMade 19-degree Rescue club to score the ace -- her first ever. She was awarded \$500 for the shot in the Donald T. Ostop Hole-in-One Challenge.

"I was hoping for my first ace to be on TV, but this will do," laughed Simpson, a non-exempt LPGA Tour member. "I told my caddie that we needed to play 17 smart and then attack No. 18. I just wanted to hit it solid because the wind was in our face, blowing left to right. It hit just short and kept rolling left toward the hole. My thought was, 'They never go in,' but then it just dropped into the hole. My caddie and I did a belly slam on the tee."

## Tour Chat

**LORNA MIEDEMA** of Calgary, Alberta won the Canadian PGA Women's Championship last Tuesday and Wednesday in Burlington, Ontario. It was the first CPGA National Championship for Miedema, 42, who carded rounds of 68-70 for a two-day total of 138. She edged out fellow FUTURES Tour member **MARIE-JOSEE ROULEAU** of St. Lambert, Quebec by two shots (140). Defending champion **ALENA SHARP** of Hamilton, Ontario tied for third with **KAREEN QUALLY** of Olds, Alberta at 141, while **JAN DOWLING** of Bradford, Ontario rounded out fifth at 144...

**KATHRYN CUSICK** returned to the FUTURES Tour last week in West Virginia after taking off eight months from competitive golf. Cusick was rusty, but realistic in her expectations after working most of this year as a national recruiter for a staffing company in Jacksonville, Fla. "I needed a break, but once I stepped away from competition, I realized where I wanted to be," said Cusick, who carded a 157 and missed the 36-hole cut. "Now, I see it from a totally different perspective..." Speed golfers of the week were the duo of **KIM AUGUSTA** of Rumford, R.I., and **JANA PETERKOVA** of the Czech Republic, who played in the first group of the final round and finished 18 holes in three hours and 10 minutes...

A couple of Cowgirls were together again for last week's first round of the Betty Puskar FUTURES Golf Classic. Making their FUTURES Tour debut from college golf were former Oklahoma State University teammates **KARIN SJODIN** of Gothenburg, Sweden and **ANNIE YOUNG** of Highland, Utah. Young finished tied for 15th at 213 (-3) in her pro debut and Sjodin tied for 20th at 214 (-2). The week prior to the West Virginia event, Sjodin competed in the Scandinavian TPC hosted by Annika [Sorenstam] at Barseback Golf & Country Club in Malmo, Sweden and finished the 72-hole event at 301. Young

played in the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship and lost in the second round.

"It was fun to get out here and get started," said Young, who was paired with her former teammate in the first round of last week's FUTURES Tour event. "I learned that you've gotta take it low because there are so many good players out here."

Sjodin crossed the Atlantic Ocean on Wednesday, didn't get in a full practice round on Thursday and teed it up for Friday's first round. The Swede admitted it wasn't the optimal way to prepare for her FUTURES Tour debut. "But I'm glad I came anyway," she said. "Every time you play golf, you learn something..."

There were a few other cowgirls at The Pines Country Club last week. Cattle kept busting out of an adjacent pasture to enjoy the tastier grass at The Pines Country Club on the first and seventh greens and on the eighth tee at last week's host course. That kept Tour staff members busy rounding up and shooing off the bovine each evening. The four-legged visitors also warranted an addition to the supplemental rules for Saturday's second round. On holes No. 1 and 7, rules officials allowed that "on the putting green, if a player's ball lies on a hoof print, she may take relief by placing her ball as near as possible to the original spot, but not nearer the hole. Relief is for lie of ball only." Fortunately, not a lot of golf balls had to be moooved.

## Road to the LPGA Tour

Once again, players in the top three spots on the 2005 FUTURES Golf Tour Money List remained unchanged with No. 1 Seon-Hwa Lee of Chonan, Korea, No. 2 Kyeong Bae of Seoul, Korea, and No. 3 Virada Nirapathpongporn of Bangkok, Thailand maintaining their positions in the money race.

But with rookie Sun Young Yoo's win last week at the Betty Puskar FUTURES Golf Classic in Morgantown, W.Va., and Nicole Castrale's tie for 23rd, Castrale dropped from fourth to sixth, while Yoo climbed into the No. 4 spot to displace the Californian. Jenny Gleason of Clearwater, Fla., tied for ninth last week and retained her No. 5 spot.

"I'm very happy to win today but I feel I have to win again," said Yoo, of Seoul, Korea.

Making a jump into the top 15 was Meaghan Francella of Port Chester, N.Y., who improved from 23rd to 14th.

"The money list gets so close at the end of the year," said Francella. "You're still really sweating it until York (Pa.) if you are in the top five."

Jumping into the top 30 were: Courtney Wood of Brentwood, Tenn., moving from No. 26 to 17th; Mollie Fankhauser of Columbus, Ohio, moving from No. 30 to No. 19; Sarah Huarte of Shingle Springs, Calif., improving from No. 38 to 27th; and Meredith Duncan of Shreveport, La., moving from No. 31 to 29th.

Two tournaments remain in the 2005 FUTURES Golf Tour season with five 2006 exempt LPGA Tour cards awarded on August 28th in York, Pa. In addition, the next 10 ranked players who do not have current LPGA Tour status will automatically advance into the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament in December.

Stevenson's personal journey this year has involved the watchful eye of her swing coach, Butch Harmon. She has continued to focus on her technique and on her short game -- the part of her game that has been woefully neglected in exchange for the exhilaration of hammering golf balls into the sky. But the aspect of her game that, by golf standards, is less measurable, has been the part that has improved behind closed doors in quiet moments.

She began playing the game at age 8, but wasn't able to compete until age 17, because any town large enough to host a junior golf competition was a minimum of two hours away. But during the summer of 1994, Stevenson began winning junior tournaments. By 1995, she won the Utah Junior Golfer of the Year Award. She went on to win the state's amateur championship, match play championship and was the 1999 Utah Player of the Year -- earning a golf scholarship to Brigham Young University.

Reared in the religious setting of the Mormon Church, BYU's strict rules were already in practice by Stevenson in her family upbringing and in her lifelong residency in the state where the church has a prevailing cultural and ideological influence. She focused on her golf and her studies and was runner-up at the 1999 Western Athletic Conference (WAC) Championship during her senior season.

But the self-described "late bloomer" was still searching for something, both in her life and in her game.

"I'd go out and beat balls, but not really know what I was doing," she said. "I had a lot of desire, but not enough information. In some ways, I was just sort of going through the motions."

Stevenson went to the FUTURES Golf Tour's Qualifying Tournament during the fall of 1999 and qualified for the 2000 season. But that first year, she made four of 10 tournament cuts with a tie for 53rd as her best finish. She skipped a year, then came back in 2002 and made 10 of 15 cuts with a season-best tie for seventh. But 2003 and 2004 were disappointments, with top season finishes of tie for 30th and tie for 24th, respectively.

It would have been easy to lose even more confidence and optimism about the 2005 season when she missed her first three tournament cuts. But that's where the new Jamie Stevenson stepped in. That's when she began applying some of the concepts of author Dr. Wayne W. Dyer into her life and golf game. That's when meditation and spiritual discovery moved Stevenson one step closer to her dream of finishing in the top-15 of the FUTURES Tour's season money list.

"There's really no secret," said Stevenson, who is no longer active in the Mormon Church. "I just had to find peace and contentment with who I am, with my game and with what I want out here."

Dyer's book, "The Power of Intention: Learning to Co-Create Your World Your Way," explains personal intention "not as something you do, but as an energy you are a part of." And the writer's New Age spirituality, which has appealed to Stevenson, focuses on "God, goodness, inspiration and living in the present moment" -- practically a mantra by every competitive golfer attempting not to get ahead of herself during competition.

"It's comical in a way, because as driven as I am, I've completely backed down," said Stevenson. "It's almost a relief because the less pressure I put on myself, the better my results have been."

Armed with her new attitude and outlook this season, Stevenson wasn't surprised to post the two top-three

finishes. But what those finishes gave her was a gauge by which to measure herself from now on. At 5-foot-9, the former Utah all-state basketball player had the athleticism and desire to push herself, but what she needed were some additional tools. Harmon helped her with technique and course management. The books she now reads behind closed doors and the meditation she practices have enabled her to believe in her potential.

Stevenson is one of those quiet, solitary golfers who goes about her business with a purpose and little chitchat. Away from the course, she enjoys hiking, yoga, snowboarding and spending time with her family. She values the "simple, happy life" that she had as a child, playing in



the cottonseed that was fed to the cattle at the dairy farm where her father still works. She enjoys the "simple, good food" at Mom's Café in Salina, Utah, where her mother is a waitress. And she laughs when she describes learning to drive a car at age 11, and even driving herself to the local golf course at age 14 because "eight miles was too far to ride a bike with my golf clubs on my back."

Life has changed for Stevenson since those early days, but the irony is that the simple allure of standing on a mountain top and looking out to where she wants to be is even more real than it was during her teenage years of emptying her shag bag into space and hiking home satisfied. She still sets goals. She still wants to advance out of LPGA Sectional Qualifying this year in her fifth attempt. She still wants to win. But most of all, she hopes to see how good she can become in the game she loves.

"What has changed for me is not needing or desiring anything, but finding that I already have everything that is really necessary," she said. "I'm very grateful that I've been given this chance to come out here and have an opportunity. I now have some peace. I'm not beating myself up anymore. And not only is my golf better, but the sun is just a little brighter each day."

"I think it's something you have to try," said Elosegui, 23, who has won six European amateur championships. "I wasn't really nervous, but I'm excited. It is a big motivation to measure myself against these professional players."

It also was interesting for her coach to return to the FUTURES Golf Tour for the first time since 1983. Figueras-Dotti won two tournaments when the Tour was called the Tampa Bay Mini-Tour. Like today's players, she used it to prepare for the LPGA Qualifying Tournament and qualified for the LPGA in the fall of 1983.

"There is so much more opportunity for young players today," said Figueras-Dotti during her visit to last week's FUTURES Tour event. "I just wish I knew then what I know now."

# Tournament Summary

## Rookie Sun Young Yoo Captures First Win in Morgantown

From the very first tournament of the 2005 season, rookie Sun Young Yoo stepped up like a pro to play like a veteran. She finished second in that Florida debut back in March, but today, the teenager won her first professional tournament at the \$70,000 Betty Puskar FUTURES Golf Classic.

Yoo fired rounds of 67-69-68 to finish at 12-under-par 204 for her first pro title, edging Brandi Jackson of Greenville, S.C., by two shots. Jackson carded a final-round 67 at The Pines Country Club to finish solo second at 10-under-par 206, followed by top-ranked Seon-Hwa Lee of Chonan, Korea in third at 207, and LPGA Tour member Janell Howland of Boise, Idaho in fourth at 208.

While Yoo called today's win "unbelievable," it was anything but that in the eyes of her peers.

"She's one of the most solid players on this tour," said Jeanne Cho of Orlando, Fla., who finished tied for fifth at 209 (-7) with Diana D'Alessio of Flanders, N.J. "In Korea, when you do something, you do it all the way. But it's not just because she worked hard. She has a lot of talent."

"Nothing rattled her," added D'Alessio, a non-exempt LPGA Tour member who played in the final group with Yoo. "If she made a bogey, she'd come right back and make a birdie. I'm impressed."

Yoo was impressive. Her first nine holes on the 6,334-yard course included five birdies and two bogeys. She certainly didn't look like a teenager scared to contend or win.

"Maybe I was a little nervous today," said Yoo, 18, a native of Seoul, Korea. "I just drink some water and say it's OK."

It was better than OK, though. Yoo took bogey on the 10th hole, benefited from a lucky kick out of the woods on the 14th hole, rolled in a birdie on the 16th from nine feet, saved par on a nearly five-foot, downhill sliding putt on the 17th, and then drained a three-footer for her final birdie on the last hole. Each time she seemed to wobble, she quickly righted herself.

"I am very happy to win today, but it's just for today," said Yoo, who used 26 putts, hit 13 greens and missed only three fairways in today's final round of the 14th annual Morgantown event. "I'm determined to go forward and maybe win again."

The timing of this week's 16th tournament catapulted Yoo into the No. 4 position on the season money list with two tournaments to play and it moved her into the No. 1 position for rookie points. Again, those moves surprised few who have watched Yoo post nine top-10 finishes in 16 events this season in a year that has included one runner-up and one third-place finish.

"With this win under her belt, she's just going to open up and win again," said good pal Meaghan Francella of Port Chester, N.Y., who tied for seventh at 210 (-6) with Sarah Huarte of Shingle Springs, Calif. "Sun Young is a great player. I could watch her hit balls all day and when she steps up to putt, she rolls it so well. She's young, but she plays very mature golf."

Yoo and Francella clicked this season after playing some practice rounds together. Yoo teaches the New Yorker Korean phrases. The New Yorker once told Yoo that she hits the ball "pure."

"She asked me, 'Pure? What does that mean?'" said Francella, who played collegiately at the University of North Carolina. "Now, she gets it."

And so does everybody else. Perhaps especially, Jackson, who birdied four of her first nine holes and appeared

to be gaining momentum on Yoo. But the teen grabbed a share of the lead with Howland on the fourth hole, moved ahead with the lead on No. 5, and then birdied holes eight and nine for a two-shot lead over Jackson. Jackson, a former Furman University collegian, battled back with a birdie on the 11th while Yoo bogeyed the 10th to draw even at 10-under par. Jackson bogeyed the 14th, then birdied the 16th, but Yoo was in cruise control with birdies on two of her last three holes.

"It's hard to get that close and know I could have won, but this is the best I've played all year," said Jackson, who was an exempt member of the LPGA Tour in 2004. "I gave it a try. I had a chance."

But Yoo was untouchable, just as she has been for most of her amateur career back home in Korea.

"She won a couple of big amateur tournaments in Korea, so she is prepared to win here," said fellow rookie Hye Jung Choi of Seoul, who finished tied for 23rd. "Sun Young was on the Korean National Team, which means she was [among the] top five in the nation for amateur girls."

"She is young, but she has a lot of experience," added Su A Kim of Seoul, who tied for 30th. "For her to win now and make the top five is very important."

Indeed it was for Yoo, who succeeds this tournament's 2004 winner, Jimin Kang, as a player most likely to earn one of the five LPGA Tour cards to be presented in two weeks. As an LPGA Tour member this season, Kang notched her first LPGA Tour victory back in May. Yoo's peers believe the teen will achieve that same milestone a year from now.

"She's ready to move on," said Cho.

"She's got a lot of success left in her and she's definitely ready for the next level," added Francella.

But with two weeks remaining in the season, Yoo is already thinking about what she still has to accomplish. She might be 18 years old, but this is a teen with a plan. Come to think of it, that plan started with her first tee shot back in March.
