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Duramed FUTURES Tour Weekly News Release
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1. Globetrotting Samantha Head Happy To Stay Stateside

At this time of the competitive schedule, there are many "shoulda-woulda-couldas" coming from the mouths of pros who wish they had played differently during the season. Samantha Head, a veteran touring pro playing her rookie year on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, made a late-season discovery that had her longing for a different outcome.

"When you're on tour, you can be anywhere in the world, but if I had just focused on being here, I'm sure I could have done a bit better," said Head, 33, of Bedford, England, who has played seven years on the Ladies European Tour (LET) and three years on the Japan LPGA (JLPGA). "You always learn things playing tournament golf, but what I learned this year is you have to get balance, and balance means playing on one tour."

Of course, when the invitations come from large-purse events or tournaments in her European homeland, Head found them hard to resist. She ended up jetting back and forth across the Atlantic, fighting jetlag and injuries, as she skipped tournaments here. With one tournament remaining in the 2006 Duramed FUTURES Tour schedule, she's currently ranked 21st on the money list and knows she has to make a move forward if she wants to advance directly into the LPGA's Final Qualifying Tournament.

"You have to think of what you want in the long run -- not what you want right now," she said.

And what Head's long-term goal includes is playing on the LPGA Tour alongside her twin sister, Johanna Head. With Sam playing in Europe and in Asia in recent years and Jo playing in the United States, the twins have had to put their dream of playing together on the same tour on hold for many years.

"We've spent quite a few years apart, so it will be weird if we do finally end up on the same tour," said sister Jo, who has had LPGA status for four years. "But I really hope she makes it. I admire her ability to not be afraid to go to Japan or to the Duramed FUTURES Tour alone. She has a good fighting spirit and I'm her No. 1 fan."

The twins began playing golf at age 13 after spending several years training in ballet and playing various musical instruments. By age 17, they quit high school to work in a golf shop until they were 21. Both held three different jobs as they worked on their games, planning their respective pro careers.

"I worked Monday through Friday for a company that booked golf holidays, and weekends at a golf shop and also in a nursing home, wiping bottoms," said Sam. "Every penny I've earned came from what I earned for myself."

But the road to professional golf was more difficult than the twins expected and it eventually forked, with Jo marrying and making it to the LPGA and Sam laboring on the LET in various European countries. She won on the LET and lived in Madrid for four years. She was married, but later divorced. And then she ended up in Japan.

"It was like night and day there," said Sam of the three years she lived and played in Japan. "My room was sometimes so small that I had to sleep with my suitcase on my bed. I made porridge in a tiny kettle and I just never wanted to go back to my room because it was so small that I had to duck to go in."

At 5-foot-7, Head is no giant. And she soon learned that she was no giant in Japan, finishing 37th on the JLPGA's money list her first year, 42nd her second year and 66th in her final season. She played against the likes of young superstar Ai Miyazato and veteran Ayako Okamoto, and made a decent living as a resident of Tokyo for three years. But in the end, she longed for friends and comfort and a time zone more conducive to staying in touch with her family.

"I really learned to appreciate life and in the end, I found that money didn't bring me happiness," said Sam. "It's a long, long way from home. If Jo had been there, it would have been completely different."

But Jo was cutting her teeth on the LPGA Tour. And Sam found herself flying into Chicago from Japan in June 2005, hoping to make a life for herself stateside. She had heard about the Duramed FUTURES Tour and wanted the chance to play American golf courses.

"I told her it would give her good perspective about what to expect on the LPGA Tour," said Jo, who is older by seven minutes. "She called and said, 'But I don't know where these places are,' and I said, 'Well, I suggest that you buy a good map.'"

And that was the beginning of Samantha Head's stateside journey on the 2006 Duramed FUTURES Tour. Used to playing with more established professionals between the ages of 20-30 on the LET and JLPGA, Sam now found herself playing on a tour where the average age is 25 and where there were a number of teenage pros. But while her experience would have seemingly given her an upper hand, Sam again found there were lessons to be learned.

"I had no illusions about this Tour because I knew the girls were good out here," she said. "It's almost easier for the young ones because they don't know anything else. Memory is not always a great thing."

But the 11-year pro has found her place. And with the encouragement of boyfriend Santiago Mari, a clubfitter at the David Leadbetter Academy headquarters in Orlando, Fla., Sam hopes she'll move into the Tour's top 15 spots on the money list for a chance at a direct entry into the LPGA's Final Qualifying Tournament.

"Those two [sisters] give each other motivation and playing on the LPGA Tour is something they both want," said Mari. "Sam has been very patient and she's not

lacking anything right now. She's come to a tour where she didn't know anybody and she's learned a lot about her game."

She also has produced some solid numbers this season, averaging 71.769 strokes per round (ranking sixth on the Tour), 29.219 putts per round, while hitting 85 percent of her fairways and 66 percent of her greens in regulation.

"She hasn't had the results she's wanted here yet, but I think she's one round away from winning over here," added Mari. "She's still getting ready for next year."

And with a season under her belt, Sam's dream of joining her sister has moved a little closer. An active LET member by virtue of its career money list, she traveled abroad to compete in Switzerland, France and Hungary this season. But concern for her spot on the Duramed FUTURES Tour Money List had her saying no to Holland, Sweden, Norway and Wales. She even withdrew from playing the Monday qualifier for the Weetabix Women's British Open, for which she has qualified five times in five tries.

And while Sam's passport has stamps from such places as Qatar, China, Malaysia, Thailand, Australia, New Zealand and practically every country in Europe, as well as a catalogue of Japanese visas, she is content to point her focus stateside. Sure, if she gains automatic entry into the LPGA's final stage of Q-School, she might play in the English Open and Dubai Open in October. But for now, Sam plans to pour her energies into finding a way of spending 2007 on the LPGA Tour with her twin -- hopefully for many years.

"I feel settled in my private life, but the golf part is bloody hard because you have to be totally dedicated with such high competition here and on the LPGA Tour," Sam said. "But now, I have one focus and thank God, I haven't finished this season quite yet."

2. Tour Chat

SONG-HEE KIM of Seoul, Korea pocketed \$1,000 last weekend as the winner of the CHAMP Spikes East Coast Challenge, a bonus program set up for the Tour's events staged in Connecticut through Pennsylvania. The program rewards the top players who wore CHAMP spikes in three out of six tournaments. The other top-five finishers were as follows: 2nd, **BRANDI JACKSON** of Greenville, S.C., \$500; 3rd **KRISTY MCPHERSON** of Conway, S.C., \$300; 4th **ANGELA PARK** of Torrance, Calif., \$200; and 5th **SARAH LYNN JOHNSTON** of St. Charles, Ill., \$100... **JESSICA LEWIS** of Bethesda, Md., picked up a quick \$500 during the first round last week when she won the Duramed Hole-In-One Challenge with an ace on the third hole. Lewis used a 7-iron and played the downhill pin position on Friday as 155 yards. It was her third career ace and first in competition. "I can buy some gas now," joked Lewis, a second-year player...

KRISTINA TUCKER of Stockholm, Sweden was the winner of Etonic's "First One There" in the East Award last weekend. Tucker won \$500 for having the lowest first-round score in the span of East Coast tournaments from Connecticut to Pennsylvania. She opened the Tour's event in Syracuse with a first-round score of five-under-par 66. The award is presented to low-scoring players who are wearing Etonic shoes... **KRISTY MCPHERSON** of Conway, S.C. showed up on the first tee in last week's final round with a white skort that she attempted to get rookie **SONG-HEE KIM** of Seoul, Korea to wear. Kim, who has worn long pants for most of the season and who only began wearing shorts halfway through the year, laughed and declined McPherson's fashion offer.

The city of Gettysburg, Pa., has a well-documented history that draws tourists from throughout the world. So a number of players, caddies and parents made a point to check out the famous Civil War battlefields throughout last week. **GINA UMECK'S** father, Bob Umeck, a high school history teacher in Redlands, Calif., stayed in the home of a West Point graduate and got a special military perspective whenever he

wasn't pulling caddie duties for his daughter... Rookie **LAURA KORUS** of Parker, Colo., wore a Confederate hat during Friday's first round and a Union hat in Saturday's second round and reported that of her two rounds (she missed the 36-hole cut), "the Union actually won, but they both were pitiful." Korus also bought a CD for a driving tour and did the "Ghost Tour," which rendered some unusual "orbs" on photos that she took. "There's no dust on my camera, but these little bubbles came up on the pictures, which is a little freaky," she said. "It makes you wonder..." Canadians **KAREEN QUALLY** of Olds, Alberta and **JILLIAN WYNE** of Calgary, Alberta, along with **SHAYNE WILD** of Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, all brushed up on their U.S. history when they hired a guide to ride in their car and give them a battleground tour. "We had a northerner giving the tour," said Qually, who played college golf at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. "But he spoke very highly of the causes from both sides and the pageantry of the war. It was a very worthwhile tour..."

Australian players on the Duramed FUTURES Tour get a treat at least once a year when Mac McCuskey of the Australian Embassy makes the 80-mile trip up the highway from Washington, D.C., to visit with the Tour's Aussies. McCuskey has been visiting the Tour for the last three years. He's also continued to follow former Duramed FUTURES Tour member **LINDSEY WRIGHT** of Albury, Australia on the LPGA Tour for the last two years at the McDonald's LPGA Championship in nearby Maryland. As usual, McCuskey came bearing Australian beer, TimTams (cookies) and vegemite -- all items that are difficult for the players to find stateside...

One of the Gettysburg newspapers ran a feature story on Texans **KRISTIN DUFOUR** of Austin and **RANDI MEADOWS** of San Antonio. The two had their photo taken together and they crossed their Callaway drivers for the picture. Unfortunately, the two drivers got switched by accident and the two Texans ended up playing with each other's drivers in Friday's first round. "When I hit it off the first tee, I thought it sounded a little funny," said Dufour...

4. The Road To The LPGA

With only one tournament remaining in the Tour's 2006 season, the top five spots, along with the top 15 positions on the money list, experienced a little shakeup last week.

Top-ranked Song-Hee Kim of Seoul, Korea, continued to pad her lead with her fifth season win. She now has earnings of \$75,086 after 17 events to lead No. 2 Charlotte Mayorkas of Las Vegas, with earnings of \$57,851 in 15 events; and No. 3 In-Bee Park of Las Vegas with \$43,427 in 16 events.

"I didn't really pay attention that much to the money list, but as [Charlotte] moved closer to my position, I felt a little pressure because she practices so hard," said Kim, whose win last week helped add some cushion to her lead over the former UCLA star.

On the heels of her third-place finish last week, Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., moved from fifth to fourth place with \$39,601. McPherson takes a \$5,219 lead over fifth-ranked Angela Park of Torrance, Calif., who made a timely leap from the No. 8 spot with season earnings of \$34,382. But Park's cushion is only worth \$103 over sixth-ranked Ashley Prange of Noblesville, Ind., a two-time season winner, who slipped from No. 4 to No. 6 last week.

Angela Park, who turned 18 last Friday, made her move into the top five of the money list for the first time this season by firing a final-round 66 (-6) last week at The Gettysburg Championship to finish fourth. She, In-Bee Park (no relation) and Song-Hee Kim, all age 18, represent the teen talent that has charged into the Tour's top five money positions.

"I struggled in the middle of the season, but I learned a lot and I'm glad I came here to this Tour," said Angela Park. "I finally told myself not to look too far ahead and to stop trying to force things to happen."

While the top five players will earn automatic and fully exempt 2007 LPGA Tour status, the next 10 players on the money list who don't have non-exempt LPGA status, will advance into the LPGA's Final Qualifying Tournament, skipping the sectional qualifiers. (LPGA Tour members automatically return to the Q-School Finals.) Currently, four LPGA Tour members occupy the No. 6 through 15 spots, which means they are skipped and the next available player who is not an LPGA player moves into the "next 10" spots eligible to go to the LPGA Final Qualifying.

But with one event remaining, competition will intensify as players make a last charge for the top five and the top 15 money positions. Changing last week were the following players: Allison Fouch of Grand Rapids, Mich., dropping from No. 6 to No. 7; Meaghan Francella of Port Chester, N.Y., falling from No. 7 to No. 8; Hye Jung Choi of Seoul, Korea, improving from No. 10 to No. 9; Mollie Fankhauser of Columbus, Ohio, slipping from No. 9 to 10th; Brandi Jackson of Greenville, S.C., moving from 12th to 11th; Sarah Huarte of Shingle Springs, Calif., slipping from 11th to 12th; and Jin Young Pak of Kang Leung, Korea, making a big move from 20th to 13th.

Losing ground by one position were: recent winner Ashley Hoagland of Palmetto, Fla., dropping from 13th to 14th; Ha-Na Chae of Seoul, Korea, from 14th to 15th; Salimah Mussani of Burlington, Ontario, from 15th to 16th; Sarah Lynn Johnston of St. Charles, Ill., from 16th to 17th; Smriti Mehra of Calcutta, India, from 17th to 18th; and Lori Atsedes of Ithaca, N.Y., who stayed at the 19th position.

Players moving into the top 49 were: Mo Martin of Altadena, Calif., who improved from 50th to 44th; and Julie Tvede of Copenhagen, Denmark, who moved up from 57th to 46th.

Improving within the second 50 spots was: LeAnna Wicks of Brighton, Mich., from 65th to No. 59; Becky Lucidi of Poway, Calif., from No. 82 to 65th; Ashley Gomes of Pleasanton, Calif., from No. 79 to 70th; Kim Welch of Sacramento, from 83rd to 72nd; Megan Heckeroth of Los Angeles from 80th to No. 73; and Eunjung Lee of Murrieta, Calif., from 90th to No. 85.

Duramed FUTURES Tour members who finish in the top-90 on the 2006 money list also will have protected status for the following 2007 competitive season and will not have to return to the Tour's annual qualifying tournament.

5. Rookie Song-Hee Kim Grabs Fifth Season Win In Gettysburg

Just how good is rookie Song-Hee Kim, who claimed her fifth season title today at The Gettysburg Championship?

Consider that she has already matched alumna Grace Park's 1999 record of five season wins. And she's currently \$6,443 shy of tying Beth Bauer's all-time single season Duramed FUTURES Tour earnings record of \$81,529, set in 2001.

After today's final round of the inaugural \$75,000 event staged at The Links At Gettysburg course, Kim now owns a 2-0 playoff record. Her second extra-holes win came today when she fired a final-round 68 and edged out compatriot Jin Young Pak of Kang

Leung, Korea on the second playoff hole. Both players tied at 206 (-10) in a hole-for-hole battle that went back and forth all day.

"It was fun to watch," said Kristy McPherson of Conway, S.C., who carded a final-round 71 (-1) and finished third at 208 (-8). "I was trying to catch them, but I couldn't even get my foot in the door. Song-Hee is just a great putter."

Make that great putter, irons player, tee-ball striker, course manager and one cool customer.

On her 18th birthday last month, the shy, lanky teen won her fourth season title. This week, after rounds of 72-66-68, she made a formidable golf course with lightning-fast greens look like a fun walk in pre-autumn Pennsylvania. Her most animated moment came when several players chased her down on the final green and doused her with a celebratory beer bath. Kim wrinkled her nose at the smell on her shirt -- not even old enough to drink the bubbly if she had liked it. And for the record, it was the only time all week that anybody chased down Kim and really caught her.

"I never thought I could win five times this year," said Kim, of Seoul, Korea. "My goal was to get into the top 10. I thought maybe I could win one of the 19 tournaments."

But she has won five of her 17 tournament starts with 11 top-10 finishes. With only one tournament remaining (next month in Albany, N.Y.), Kim has earned \$75,086 and could move on to the LPGA Tour as one of the most accomplished players to have ever passed through the Duramed FUTURES Tour.

"Her swing is fundamentally perfect," said rookie Brooke Mangan of Melbourne, Australia. "I'd like to have a video of it."

"I was playing behind her one round and she was having a horrible day," said Kellee Booth of McKinney, Texas. "I found out later she shot a 69 or 70. She's just super steady."

Kim actually started the final round three shots behind Pak, a second-year player whose last win came in March 2005. But Pak, a streaky player who can go low, dropped two shots on her first hole today with a double bogey. That locked her into a tie with McPherson, a two-time 2006 season winner, and left Kim only a shot back.

But Pak hit her approach on the second hole to tap-in range to move ahead by one and stayed there until Kim hit a 7-wood to 15 feet and rolled in an eagle on No. 4. McPherson birdied the fourth hole from 12 feet. At that point, the trio in the final group were tied at eight under.

McPherson bogeyed the fifth and eighth holes and admits to becoming rattled by a ruling on Pak at the eighth hole. Initially, Pak was assessed a two-shot penalty for tapping down her pitch mark when her ball plugged, but the ruling was rescinded by the ninth hole after rules officials reevaluated the situation and deemed that Pak had not gained advantage.

"It could have gone either way because it was a complete judgment call," said McPherson. "But the whole thing sort of took me out of it for a while."

McPherson rallied on the back nine with a birdie from 40 feet on the 12th hole, birdie chances on the 13th and 14th holes, and finally, a 90-yard gap wedge to three feet for birdie on the final hole.

But all day, it was really a two-horse race with Kim and Pak swapping leads four times and sharing the lead five times in today's final round. The scorekeepers on the main leaderboard never had a chance to sit down all day.

"It was fun because it was up and down, up and down," said Pak, 20.

Pak grabbed a one-shot lead on the 10th hole when Kim bogeyed, and then she added a birdie on the 11th hole to take a two-stroke lead. But Kim birdied 13 and 15 to tie it up again at 10 under. Pak birdied the 16th to move ahead by one, but Kim rolled in an eight-footer to tie the lead with Pak at 11 under going into 18.

On the final hole of regulation, Pak drove into a patch of woods on the left and was forced to hit out from under some tree branches. Her shot clipped the limbs and kicked into a water hazard. She ended up making a 10-footer for bogey, seemingly opening the door for Kim. All Kim had to do was two-putt from 35 feet across the green. But the door swung open again for Pak when the rookie's six-foot par putt spun out of the hole for bogey.

"After I missed that putt, I thought, 'OK, it's not my day,'" said Kim of her inability to close out the tournament in regulation.

The flip side of that thought was that she had won a nine-hole playoff back in May in El Paso, Texas. If she had survived that marathon, surely she could close out this chance for her fifth title.

Both players returned to the par-five 18th tee for the first playoff hole and both two-putted for par. Then they moved to the adjacent 12th hole -- a 152-uphill, par-three tester bordered by water.

Kim went first and gassed her 5-iron over the back of the green. It landed next to the red hazard stake, which she was allowed to remove. Seeing Kim's shot fly long, Pak pulled a 7-iron, but landed her tee shot short. It hit the front of the green and rolled back to the front collar, some 60 feet below the hole. Pak's putt rolled five feet short of the hole and she hurried up the green and marked before gravity pulled her ball back down the slick surface. That gave Kim time to think about how she was going to chip from the back rough some 50 feet away and delicately land her shot on the quick green.

And that was, perhaps, the shot that set her apart from the field over 20 holes today. Kim's touch was everything her peers have talked about all season. Her chip landed softly, perfectly, and rolled to within four feet. She tapped in for par. Pak's five footer scooted past the hole on the right side for bogey. And Kim, in her Asian aw-shucks kind of way, extended her hand to shake another victory into the record books.

"She's a great player," admitted Pak. "I like her mind control out there. I'm happy, but I'm a little disappointed."

"She's just *really* good," added first-round leader Julie Tvede of Copenhagen, Denmark, who tied for eighth at 212 (-4). "When Song-Hee wins, it's because she gets into that position and stays there."

Presented by Klein Builders Group and Hanover Honda, this week's 54-hole event marked the Tour's 20th annual visit to South Central Pennsylvania and its inaugural visit to Gettysburg. But in the two decades that the Tour has visited this part of the Keystone State, players like Grace Park, Beth Bauer, Julieta Granada, and now Song-Hee Kim, took their victories here and launched their careers on to the LPGA Tour.

Which brings us back to the original question of how good is Song-Hee Kim?

Good enough to have three wins more than any other player on the Duramed FUTURES Tour this year. Good enough to have more than a \$17,000 lead over the second-ranked player on the money list. Good enough to have a hands-down lead on Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year honors.

And even with one tournament remaining on the 2006 Duramed FUTURES Tour schedule, she's good enough to start making her travel plans for the 2007 LPGA Tour.
